
Those who missed visiting the Group's stand at this event will have a chance to see the display at our own Lexden History Day, September 23rd.


TIMELY TOPIC

According to Mr S. F. Hurnard, who lived in Hill House, Lexden Street in 1896, the average yearly rainfall in Lexden was 23 inches.

Did Lexden ever have a Brass band?



This programme for a huge Fete and Demonstration organised by the Colchester Friends' First Day School was found in the Church archives. Members came from all over Colchester and the surrounding areas, with banners waving, lead by their own local brass band. The bands taking part are listed below in the same programme.



The first Band, The Excelsior band did not march but sat under the trees entertaining the guests while the others marched from Old Heath,

Hythe and even from Myland and Copford.

In the period between 1880 and 1914 nearly every village and hamlet had a brass band. There were an estimated 40,000 bands in the United Kingdom. Now there are only about 3,000 so somewhere there must be an awful lot of old instruments and uniforms tucked away in cupboards and attics.

Which brings us back to the main question, did Lexden have its own band? Many bands were attached to the Methodist church - Copford and Myland were two. Old Heath may have been connected with Congregational 'Tin Tabernacle' still up in Old Heath. Boxted Methodist Band was started in 1860 and still exists today, the oldest Methodist band in the Country.

This one small document has raised several questions but one more remains—what other important events took place in Lexden Park? Methinks that acre or two could tell some real tales of Lexden merrymaking.

Has anyone got any information on brass bands or Lexden Park please?



Another Tragic accident at Lexden Park

During Christmas week 1832 there was a spate of burglaries in Lexden. Thieves had already broken into the Rectory in Spring Lane and Mr Mills of Lexden Park, thinking that they may be lurking in his parklands, brought out a pair of old pistols intending to give them to his butler James Marriage to clean in case they were needed. One of the locks was stiff from misuse and in trying to ease it the pistol went off and hit the servant just as he was leaving the room. Mr Mills fainted from the shock but the servant staggered into the kitchen with blood pouring from bullet wounds in his arm, the bone of which was in splinters. Despite being attended by Mr Mill's private doctors James Marriage died that evening and with his last breath exonerated his master for a pure freak accident.

During the funeral at Lexden Church Mills was distraught and undertook to educate James Marriage's ten year old daughter as his own and to make a handsome provision for her future.

James Marriage was the second of three servants to die at Lexden Park in three successive years and is buried in a trimorial grave erected by Mr Mills facing his old master's house just across Church Lane.

The Group held its first summer walk meeting on a fairly overcast but warmish June evening. Numbers were limited as it was a joint walk with members of the West Bergholt History Group, a well established club.

The route took us down Spring lane to look at the site of the now demolished Lexden Mill. It was pulled down around 1970 to link Spring Lane to the (then) newly constructed Avenue of Remembrance roundabout.

We then were taken into a private garden where the beautifully landscaped mill pool still exists and then on to the second mill just across the river. A little way along Spring lane we turned into The Chaseway, an ancient track leading up to Lexden Lodge which was the Manorial Court in medieval

times. Round behind the Lodge we stepped back in time some 2,000 years to stand in the Iron Age earthworks that were dug in a huge arc stretching from Braiswick right through Lexden Park to join up with Grimesdyke in Straight road.

It is believed that these earthworks in Lexden were also the site of the encampment for the Parliamentarian soldiers during the Siege of Colchester in 1648. Certainly all the windmills and watermills in the area were badly damaged by Fairfax's troops as they thought they could be Royalist look-out posts.

Returning down Chaseway we were hosted by David and Elaine Cawdell in their beautiful riverside garden with wine and salmon sandwiches, a perfect end to a perfect walk—roll on the next one.

Editor's note.

The members of the West Bergholt History Group also enjoyed the walk and meeting the new Lexden members and have suggested a return walk around their village next summer.
