

Closed despite fierce opposition

Despite appeals by many organisations, including the Lexden History Group, petitions containina thousand several sianatures, dozens letters in the local papers support from Colchester MP Bob Russell. the Essex Record Office in Stanwell Street, home to all the history Colchester and looks surrounding area, likely to close and most, if not all, material moved to Chelmsford.

This is seen by the County Council as a cost saving exercise but they have assured Colcestrians that many of the records will be digitised and will eventually be available on the internet (the cost of

this project is not yet known nor how many years it will take). What is known is that only the ERO catalogue is available at present on the internet so you can at least look to see what you want before making the long trek over to Chelmsford.

Local historians can access the catalogue by typing in seax. essexcc.gov.uk via the internet but you will need a Reader's Ticket to do so.

According to the Essex County Standard our local council 'champion', Portfolio Holder for Culture, Kevin Bentley said it would be difficult to find a suitable replacement for the

Taking Shape

The Lexden village sign, originally the idea of the Lexden Conservation Group and carried forward by the Lexden History Group is taking shape rapidly.

The superb 3D polystyrene model (above) is the work of Tim and Carol Holding from Little Glebe, Spring Lane. It depicts the main elements of the village, the Sun Inn, the church, the mill and includes a butterfly representing the Papillon family who were, one time, the Lords of the Manor.

The sign will be cast in

aluminium sections by an ingenious technique akin to the 'lost wax process' but the molten aluminium will actually melt the polystyrene instead of the wax.

The siting of the sign has yet to be finally decided. Current options are on the Lexden meadows near Lexden Road or near the roundabout by the Crown Inn.

Although the Committee has pledged £500, a grant needs to be sought to raise the remaining costs of the project and anyone with experience of preparing a grant application should contact Tim on Colchester 576149.

Village Signs and more

Our speaker at the January meeting was a 'man from the Ministry'. In addition to being Rector of Tollesbury, the Revd. Keith Lovell could easily be described as the Man from the Ministry - of Trivial Information.

His talk on village signs covered many local areas but, such was his vast knowledge of 'all things trivial' (his words) the large audience of around 70 members also learned about post boxes in Scotland, the origins of a costermonger, the history of Scouting and how Marks Tey helped in the rebuilding of London after the Great Fire of

1666.

Our tour of the villages included Aldham where the Roman river has nothing to do with the Romans; Ardleigh where the reservoir (normally) holds 485 million gallons of water: Copford where cartwheels were soaked in the village pond overnight to swell them and make them fit the iron rims; Stanway whose sign features an elephant and a London Plane tree; Marks Tey whose brickworks were kept busy making bricks after Great Fire of London in 1666.

A thoroughly interesting evening enjoyed by all with a speaker who is already on the list to be invited again.

A New initiative by LHG

A suggestion made and approved at the recent Committee meeting aims to raise the profile of the Lexden History Group and create links with other similar groups in North East Essex.

The idea came to David Cawdell after he accepted invitations to give talks to several local history groups in the area. It obviously struck him that, because of the nature of local group rarely history. each communicated with other history groups. His suggestion was for Lexden History Group organise a 'Saturday to Seminar' when Committee members of the eight or ten groups in this area could meet each other, discuss common issues and give short presentations about their own research projects. Another bonus spin-off will be an interchange of details about good speakers etc.

It is hoped that the event will take place in Lexden Church Hall sometime in October, depending upon availability, two well-known local historians will probably also be invited to give 'keynote speeches'.

A DVD copy of the films shown by Bernard at the November meeting (see report elsewhere in this issue).


Plan of the building plots available in Fitzwalter Road before development.

COLCHESTER THROUGH THE LENS

This is the title of a very interesting exhibition in the gallery at Colchester Castle Museum which you all must visit. The National Monuments Register offered their travelling exhibition to the Castle Museum and this has been greatly augmented and enhanced by dozens of superb local pictures and artefacts from the Colchester Museum's Resource Centre in Ryegate Road.

The exhibition is on until April 27th and is a fascinating insight into daily life, transport, entertainment, wartime and Colchester businesses, giving a nostalgic peek at the past. There is even a seaside end-of-the-pier panel with holes that you can stick you head through to have your photograph taken in Edwardian costume and a touchy-feely hands-on display for younger visitors.

In the background you can listen to contemporary interviews with Colchester people about the items on display, recorded by courtesy of Colchester Recalled, together with music and sound effects of the 1900's. It's a must-see experience. Do go.
